The American Indian Resource Center's (AIRC) mission is to play a key leadership role in creating and maintaining a positive climate for racial/ethnic diversity at the University. In carrying out this mission the Center has identified four components of diversity as outlined in Dr. Sylvia Hurtado's book *Enacting Diverse Learning Environments: Improving the Climate for Racial/Ethnic Diversity in Higher Education*. The Center is committed to focusing on the following four elements presented by Hurtado:

1. Historical Legacy of Inclusion/Exclusion;
2. Structural Diversity;
3. Psychological Climate and;
4. Behavioral Dimensions.

An important facet of the Center's mission is to develop a partnership with the indigenous people of the Central Coast, the Costanoan and their specific tribes: the Esselen Nation, the Amah-Mutsun Tribe, and the Muwekama Ohlone Tribes.

Her areas of expertise are Indigenous History, Museum Studies, Memory and American History, Native American Cultural Production, Public History, and Ho-Chunk Tribal History.
