- Stores Transcripts, LOR, and other Documents -- meant to make application process easier








- Apply a Year Ahead

 - Transcripts










- Arguably the **MOST**important aspect of
 application
- Never take it for practice
- Recommended to it take 1-2 times



LSAT Cont.


- Score between 120 and 180
- Average is 150
- Offered 6 times a year
- Digital starting this July
- 4 sections + experimental section + writing sample
 - Reading Comprehension
 - Analytical Reasoning
 - Logical Reasoning x2
 - Writing Sample

GRE (Graduate Record Exam)

About 20 schools accept the GRE
 If you take LSAT AND GRE, they will look at the LSAT

- A+ is 4.33 for CAS GPA
- Most important after LSAT

VLetters of Recommendation

- Academic
- Who KNOWS you the best
- Usually need 2
- Quality vs. Quantity







Resume

- Should have an Academic focus
 - O Remember, you're a student first and foremost
- Academic achievements, leadership, activism, study abroad experiences
- Resumes are looked at for an average of
 6 seconds so keep it short and sweet
 Stop by drop-ins to get that resume
 - Stop by drop-ins to get that resume critiqued!





Personal Statement




- Present yourself as more than just GPA and LSAT numbers
- Academic/personal background, extra curriculars, work experience, etc (don't repeat your resume)
- Why you want to study law or why you would be great at it



Supplemental Essays

- Diversity Statements
 - If anything about your upbringing makes you diverse
 - O NOT mandatory
- Addendums
 - Extenuating circumstances, Low GPA or LSAT score,
 Disciplinary Actions, Emergencies
 - NOT a place for EXCUSES
 - O Some schools require for LSAT score discrepancies

Gap Year

- Decide ahead of time if you want to take a Gap Year
- Pros:
 - O Life experience/ Gain full time work experiences (resume booster)
 - O Study for LSAT
 - O A break from school
 - o Law Schools like it / could make you a stronger applicant



All drop-ins are on a first-come first-served basis and are 15 minutes for quick questions (resume critique, application and resources overview etc).




