When do you get consent to get sexual with someone—

NO means
NO

"I really like you, but..." means NO!

"You've/I've been drinking" means NO!

"No thanks" or "Not now" means NO!

"Can we just go to sleep/cuddle?" means NO!

"I don't think this is a good idea" means NO!

"[Please] don't [touch me/do that]" means NO!

You have a right as a UCSC Student to be free of, & a responsibility to refrain from, any conduct that may constitute sexual harassment or sexual assault:

- ✦ Direct propositions of a sexual nature.
- ✦ Sexual Innuendos and other seductive behavior, including pressure for sexual activity such as repeated unwanted requests for dates, and repeated inappropriate personal comments, staring, or touching.
- ✦ Direct or implied threats that submission to sexual advances will be a condition of employment, promotion, grades, etc...
- ✦ Unnecessary or unwanted touching, patting, massaging, hugging or brushing against a person's body or other unwanted conduct of a physical nature.
- ✦ Remarks of a sexual nature about a person's clothing or body.
- ✦ Impeding or blocking someone's movements.
- ✦ Unwelcome and inappropriate letters, telephone calls, electronic mail, or other communications or gifts.

What if I fear retaliation for reporting sexual assault or harassment?

- ✦ Threats, other forms of intimidation, and retaliation against anyone for reporting sexual harassment or for assisting another in bringing a complaint are prohibited. Retaliation is a violation of the law and UCSC policy, and it is a serious offense.
- ✦ UCSC takes measures to protect those who report incidents of sexual harassment or report sexual assault.
